Exclusive Interview with Kim Carter

What makes writing your passion?

Writing is very much like reading a really good book. It takes you away to another place. Often times I'm unaware of how my characters manifest themselves into the opposite of what I'd envisioned them becoming. They seem to take on a life of their own so I simply follow their lead.

What was the feeling when you published your first book?

Oh wow! I quickly learned that writing a book is just the beginning of the process. The cover, the edits, and the 'dreaded synopsis' are to follow, along with other details. But there is no other feeling in the world than actually holding your own book in your hands - the culmination of so much work, literally blood, sweat, and tears... but hardest of all, saying good-bye to characters that have become friends.

What's the story behind your choice of characters?

Honestly I have no idea how my characters form, but as I said, they often end up changing into villains or good guys without my intent, but I follow their lead. They know themselves better than I do. LOL...

The characters of Iris and Clara are, however, based off real life characters - and allow me to stress 'characters'! My mother and her friend of fifty years were an absolute hoot, just as Clara and Iris are, and I so enjoy writing about them because it brings back such fond memories of being blessed with spending time with them. They were first introduced in my novel, Sweet Dreams, Baby Belle, and everyone loved them. They were meant to be bit parts, but they clearly stole the show, making a series a no-brainer.

If you could go back in time and talk to your younger self, what would you say?

Don't allow one bad review to keep you from seeing the positive ones. Don't compromise your ideas or style because someone else thinks another way is better. Do you. Find the best and most honest editor you can and do what it takes to keep them! They are the heart of your book being a success! Don't compromise on cover design. The 'never judge a book by its cover' is B.S.! Unless you're James Patterson - the first thing to catch a reader's eye is your cover. Did I say I have the BESTEST cover designer ever? If I'm allowed to put in a plug for him - Keith Saunders can be found at www.mariondesigns.com. (No money changed hands for this endorsement...):)

Have you ever incorporated something that happened to you in real life into your novels?

Not necessarily anything that's happened to me, but I often throw in sayings that friends and family say to see if they catch them when reading. They haven't missed one yet. When we were in high school one of my friends would ask her Mom to go somewhere and if she didn't want her to go, she'd say, "No! And I don't mean maybe!" Wasn't funny to us at the time but we find it hysterical now, so I plugged it in one of my novels. I'll also throw in first or last names of friends and wait on them to find it. It's kind of cool.

Which of your characters you can compare yourself with? Did you base that character on you?

I think I can relate to certain aspects of many of my characters but if I had to choose one, it'd probably be Candace Ramsey from Dark Secrets of the Bayou. She was so funny to me, and even though my kids say - Mom, you think you're funny but you're not - I still find myself quite comical! Candace was down to earth and what ran through her mind came out of her mouth. She called everything like she saw it and never failed to express it. She was nosey and skeptical and I loved her.

What do you think, the book cover is as important as the story?

No doubt! Especially to virtually unknown authors like myself. There has to be something to entice readers to pick it up. A good cover, especially for a spooky mystery, will draw the reader in long before the story does.


Do you connect with your readers? Do you mind having a chat with them or you prefer to express yourself through your writing?

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

















CAROLE ANN MOLETI

I also find reading in any genre relaxing, and I binge some of my favorite authors. Right now, I'm reading Jane Austin's novels. Take a look at my Goodreads list!

We all know the writer's path is never evasy, what makes you keep going? What advice would you give to new authors?

I'm a member of a writer's group, which has members who can help with craft issues and content like how to shoot a bow and arrow. We have mini workshops and critique each other's submissions. I'm a member of my local Romance Writers of America chapter, which has workshops on writing craft as well as the business of writing and marketing. My advice for new authors is to take writing classes. There are so many online that help so much. Then join or form a writer's group with the people you meet in your classes. I have many friends since I started in 2005 that I met online and hail from the UK, Bulgaria, and many from the United States as well.


She enters into an uneasy alliance with Arnaldo Arroyo, a reformed addict turned community activist who schools her his own special mix of sex magick and brujería.

Will she give up and run? Or will she accept the mandate of the orishas, restore the balance between good and evil--and take back the neighborhood?



the cases they work with him.





At 77-years-old, his first novel, "Pignon Scorbion & The Barbershop Detectives" was published in early 2022 to great acclaim as an Amazon Editors' Pick, a Debut Mystery Pick by both Barnes & Noble and Publishers Weekly and was voted their Buzz Book by the Pacific Northwest Booksellers Association (among other major endorsements). It was Amazon's #1 best-selling Cozy Mystery, #1 Historical Mystery and #1 in three other categories. To support the book, Bleiweiss created a video game, theme song, t-shirts and a video trailer.

Additionally, his story in the mystery anthology Hotel California, which is being published later this summer, has been getting great advance reviews.

Rick is a member of the International Thriller Writers, Mystery Writers of America, Historical Novel Society, and the Pacific Northwest Writers Association among other organizations.

Bleiweiss started his career in music as a rock performer, producer of over fifty records (including a Grammy nomination), songwriter and record company senior executive in New York City. He worked with numerous music industry legends, including Clive Davis, Melissa Etheridge, the Backstreet Boys, Kiss, U2, Whitney Houston, the BeeGees, and many other superstars.

Since 2006 has been a publishing company executive with Blackstone Publishing, In that role he has acquired works by bestselling and award-winning authors and celebrities including Rex Pickett ("Sideways"), Robert Downey Jr, Al Roker, James Clavell ("Shogun"), PC Cast ("House of Night"), Gabriel García Márquez, Natasha Boyd ("The Indigo Girl"), Andrews & Wilson ("Tier One"), Dale Brown, Ramsey Lewis, Al Di Meola, Catherine Coulter, Heather Graham, Andrew Child, and Nicholas Sansbury Smith ("Hell Divers"), among others.

On his YouTube video show "Rick Bleiweiss' Chapter & Verse" Rick interviews best-selling authors, literary agents and other entertainment industry figures. In their segments they talk about their careers and give advice to aspiring writers.

EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW with Rick Bleiweiss

When did you start writing?

I started writing songs when I was twelve, and that same year I wrote and published a sports newspaper. I wrote a play at 15 and film scripts in college, all the while continuing to write songs. Throughout my life I've written newspaper & magazine articles and columns, but it wasn't until I was 77 years old that my first novel was published.

What makes writing your passion?

I enjoy the process of writing and I love to interact with the characters who I "meet" when they and the story they are in play out in my brain like a movie. Writing is something I find to be enjoyable, and it comes somewhat easily to me.

How long have you been writing?

Since I was twelve, but I started writing fiction in 2005 when I was 61 years old.

What was the feeling when you published your first book?

FANTASTIC!

It was very much the same feeling I had when records I produced were released.

What's the story behind your choice of characters?

They just appear in my head and they, and the story, play out like a movie which I then capture for a reader on my computer. Often I will not have the specific characters but rather the story, and then I go and flesh out the characters and who they are.

How do you get over the "writer's block"?

I rarely have it, but when I do, I walk away from whatever I'm writing and start writing something else. Then I come back to whatever I had the block about and see if it's even worth continuing or if the block was because there was no good place to go with the story.

We all know the writer's path is never easy, what makes you keep going? What advice would you give to new authors?

I keep going because I continually have stories playing in my head that I want to capture, and because I enjoy the process of writing. My advice is: write, write and write more. Writers write. Also, hone your craft, find your "voice" and write what you're good at writing.

Do you read your book reviews? How do you deal with the bad ones?

I read them all. When there is a bad review, I read it to see if I can learn something from it that will make me a better writer, and then I never read it again. I find it easy to deal with bad reviews knowing that there's no book that everyone has universally liked, and that some of the biggest books had some bad reviews. Also, some bad reviews are from trolls who probably do it just because they're not very nice people.

What is the feeling when you get a good review?

Elation. Confirmation. Happiness. Pleasure.

Have you ever incorporated something that happened to you in real life into your novels?

Yes. For example I won a crossbow competition at a British castle in the mid-nineties, and have incorporated a cross-bow into the second Scorbion novel that I just finished writing. I have incorporated some other real life events in other unpublished novels I've written too.

Which of your characters you can compare yourself with? Did you base that character on you?

I based none of my characters on me, but there's a bit of me in Scorbion (problem solving, fairness, lover of art) and in Thelma Smith, the bookshop owner in the Scorbion books (unconventional, well read lover of books, involved in social causes).

What do you think, the book cover is as important as the story?

No. The book cover is extremely important but if the book inside isn't as good as the cover then it's a bigger problem than if it was the other way around.

Do you connect with your readers? Do you mind having a chat with them or you prefer to express your-self through your writing?

I connect with most through social media and email. I have chats and general conversations. I am open to speaking with my readers, but mostly it's through the written word.

How do you feel when people appreciate your work or recognize you in public?

It's very satisfying and gratifying. I'm not yet at a level where I'm being recognized in public for my writing, but a lot of people have praised and appreciated my works - and that feels great!

What are your hobbies? What do you do in your free time?

Write, play and record music. Read. Play video games. Watch TV & film. Get together with friends. Read.

Do you have unpublished books? What are they about?

Lucky Lenny & Hector Go To Vegas is a magical realism story about a road trip two friends take to Las Vegas to win enough money for one of them to be able to buy a house. They meet some interesting characters along the way, including a hippie-like young woman who claims to be able to "read" cards from their backs.

Tourists From The 26th Dimension is a science fiction story about two aliens who come to Earth from a different dimension (for a vacation) and interact with a human telling him about what life is like in the other dimensions while they are being pursued by a governmental agency.

The Eye of Jupiter is a science fiction musical; that I've co-written and is currently being shopped by my agent. It's about an Earthling who tries to defeat a savage intergalactic overlord who has invaded our solar system and taken all humans prisoner (at least those left alive after he slaughtered most of them). It's somewhat like what Star Wars might be as a musical.

If you were allowed 3 wishes - what would they be?

Good health for me, my wife and our extended family. A world at peace in which everyone was treated the same (with respect and dignity). Fame as an author.

The Casey Jones series (seven books to date) is a humorous, semi-hardboiled series set in North Carolina featuring an unlicensed female private investigator and numerous recurring sidekicks. The Hubbert & Lil series (four books) takes place in New York City and has been described as using a "cozy with attitude" approach.






THEO AND SPROUT
